Information for presenters

All presenters should bring their presentation on a memory stick (USB removable drive). Please upload your presentation to the computer in your scheduled presentation room in the break before your presentation or earlier.

A standard time allocation for a single paper presentation is 30 minutes. Single sessions are grouped in blocks of 2, 3 or 4. All 30 minutes sessions are thought of as comprising 20 minutes for presentation and 10 minutes for questions and discussion, but other patterns of session conducted within each allotted half hour are possible. Whatever happens within the 30 minutes, please remember that people can be coming to your session from other parts of the conference or even from off campus to be there at your program time. It is important not to start early or fill gaps made by "no-shows" with actual presentations. Fill the gaps with animated discussion but don't get out of the program sequence, please.

Symposia run for blocks of 1.5 or 2 hours. Symposia are designed as a group of papers presented together, each of which contributes material for discussion. It is not intended that delegates move in and out of these sessions, as each paper comprises one part of the overall topic. The presentations within symposia may be organised in any configuration by the pre-determined chairperson; therefore there are no set start or finish times for these individual presentations. The chairperson will, however, allow at least 20 minutes for the discussant to pose questions and generate discussion at the end of the session.

Early Career Researchers and Higher Degree Research **Student Breakfast**

Breakfast session: **Research Speed Dating**

A group of researchers gathers at a known venue. Armed with a nametag, a note card and their sparkling personality, couples are paired up to begin their first 'date'. They are allowed to discuss anything related to their research. Following five minutes of conversation, a bell will ring, and they have 1 minute to fill out a "note card". On the note card, participants record features of their 'dates' research and identify any aspects that they would have an interest in following up on and/or possibly connecting with. At the end of this minute another bell will ring and people move on to meet their next date. A list of all participants will be available so that follow-up networking can occur.

MORNING WORKSHOPS

Workshop 1a: Constructing measures

This workshop will cover theoretical and practical issues that arise in the measurement of human abilities and attributes. Specifically:

- The nature of measurement
- Construct models
- Uni-dimensionality and multidimensionality
- Sufficiency and invariance
- Discrimination
- Generalisability
- Targeting
- Response scales
- Evidence of validity

Prior knowledge of statistics and/or instrument construction is not required as this will be a course for beginners. It will lay the foundation for further training in objective measurement, particularly in applications of the Rasch model.

Presenter: Rob Cavanagh

Rob Cavanagh is a Professor in the School of Education at Curtin University. He is the Director of Research and works with Higher Degree by Research students in the design and reporting of their investigations. Rob is passionate about well-being metrics - the measurement of attributes of persons and phenomena in the human sciences that contribute to individual and collective well-being. He believes that in Education, too much attention is given to what is readily available and easily quantified such as economic and psychometric data. This is in contrast to constructing new measures to learn more about learning, teaching and other interpersonal activities.

Workshop 1b: Researching education visually

The workshop is an introduction to visual methods. Foundational theoretical and ethical issues that recur in the use of visual methods within educational research will be addressed. The workshop is intended for ECR researchers who have an interest in understanding the potential applications in policy and applied research.

Presenter: Julianne Moss

Since her appointment to the Melbourne Graduate School of Education in July 2002, Dr Julianne Moss has created a research focus located in curriculum and practitioner inquiry. Collaborating with colleagues, nationally and internationally her aim is to contribute to the theoretical advancement of curriculum inquiry, particularly through the use of visual narrative.

Professor Bob Lingard is a Professorial Research Fellow in the School of Education at The University of Queensland. He has also been Professor at the University of Edinburgh (2006–2008), where he held the Andrew Bell Chair of Education, and the University of Sheffield (2003–2006) in the UK. Bob has an international research reputation in the areas of sociology of education and education policy and has published widely in these fields. His most recent books include: Globalizing Education Policy (Routledge, 2010), co-authored with Fazal Rizvi and Educating Boys: beyond structural reform (Palgrave, 2009), co-authored with Wayne Martino and Martin Mills. Bob is co-editor of the journal Discourse: Studies in the Cultural Politics of Education and editor of the book series, Keys Ideas and Education with Greg Dimitriadis (Routledge, New York).

Professor Roger Slee is the Chair of Inclusive Education at the Institute of Education, London. He is also the Founding editor of the International Journal of Inclusive Education and Editor of the London Review of Education. He has also been the Editor of the Australian Disability Review for the Disability Advisory Council of Australia. Roger was formerly Deputy Director General of Education Queensland and has been a Dean at universities in England, Australia and Canada. His current research involves disability, early childhood development and curriculum development in Iraq.

Dr Nicola F. Johnson is a senior lecturer in the Faculty of Education at Monash University, Gippsland. She has published *The Multiplicities of Internet Addiction: The Misrecognition of Leisure and Learning* (Ashgate, 2009). She teaches units within the primary education degree and the Graduate Diploma of Education program that focus on professional practice, multiliteracies, and curriculum integration.

AARE Presidential Address

Professor Jo-Anne Reid

President, Australian Association for Research in Education (AARE)

Jo-Anne Reid has been President of AARE from 2009–2010. She is Professor of Education and Associate Dean, Teacher Education in the Faculty of Education, Charles Sturt University. She began her career teaching Secondary English, and has a long-standing involvement in teacher education. She is interested in the potential of post-structuralist theories of practice for rethinking education and diversity in post-modern society.

She has published a range of books and articles on curriculum, classroom practice and research, both alone and in collaboration with others. Among her publications are Small Group Learning in the Classroom (1982), Shaping Up Nicely: The Formation of Schoolgirls and Schoolboys in the First Month of School (1994), 100 Children Go to School (1998) and 100 children turn 10 (2002), Managing (Small Group) Learning (2002) and Literacies in Place (2007).

Doing it by the numbers? Educational research and teacher education

Although there is significant interest and productivity among teacher education researchers, and considerable regard for Australian education research more generally (ARC 2007), Teacher Education as a research field is not generally well-regarded or well developed in Australia. Research efforts and effect in this particular area of education research are consequently diffuse.

It is significant that AARE did not have a teacher education SIG until this year. A survey of presentations at our own and other professional conferences, for instance, suggests there is a preponderance of small-scale studies that are not cumulatively knowledge-building or collectively coherent as a body of research that can function as a platform for building a strong research field. But this is changing, particularly as teacher education researchers have addressed the implications of a recent review of teacher education research (Murray et al 2008) that concluded that Australian research in the field of teacher education is predominantly fragmentary, noncumulative and parochial, with little longitudinal, cumulative or meta-analytic work to produce oversight and clear direction for policy and practice.

As a field of professional preparation, too, Australian teacher education is repeatedly positioned as inadequate by both public and professional commentary. Many institutions report increasing difficulty in attracting high-quality candidates to some initial teacher education programs, and there is public awareness of lower entry requirements for teaching compared with other more prestigious professions.

While the Federal government's move towards national accreditation of initial teacher education programs serves to reinforce a general deficiency view of teacher education, teachers and teaching candidates, and suggests the imposition of a standardised teaching professional who fits a prescribed, colour-by-numbers template of the Graduate Teacher, it also establishes a need for robust theoretical reconceptualisation of research-based teacher education policy, practice, curriculum and pedagogy, informed by a past/present/future perspective, that will support the next generation of teachers (and teacher educators) as they deal with the effects of increasingly complex and unpredictable educational spaces.

Policy as numbers: Ac/counting for educational research

This paper enumerates and critiques the contemporary reductive reality in education of 'policy as numbers' and its accompanying emphasis on 'evidence-based' policy. The paper looks at some specific examples of these developments, for example 'gap talk' and equity rearticulated as the social class distribution of results on international and national tests. These specificities are located within the globalized move from government to governance and the instantiation of an audit and performative policy culture. The move to governance sees reconfigured state structures and modus operandi, framed by new public management, public/private partnerships. and rescaling in relation to an emergent global educational policy field. These governance moves – new forms of deregulated regulation and emergent global strategic work of the nation state – are then contextualised against globalization (globalized policy as numbers) and neo-liberalism. Data are seen as central to the new forms of educational governance - making the system legible for governing. Policy as numbers and governance through data also have effects on education(al) research and potentially redefine it, including in respect of evidence-based policy. The disciplining effects of these new policy frames on education(al) research are outlined and critiqued. The paper argues a need for a new social imaginary to underpin contemporary education policy and policy cultures and the need for a new 'cultural physics' that would replace the 'social physics' underpinning most policy/research as numbers and also support an 'evidence-informed' approach to policy production. There are important and pressing theoretical, methodological and dispositional implications for education(al) research in this analysis, including a move beyond mantric quantitative/qualitative divides towards a principled eclecticism. The argument then is not a critique of quantitative data or methodology per se, but rather a rejection of 'epistemological innocence' and a logocentric 'God's eye' view of knowledge production in education – a rejection of the possibility of a view from everywhere and nowhere at the same time; such a stance is imperative, given the new spatio-temporalities and epistemologies associated with globalization. Indeed, the significance of both qualitative and quantitative data and methodologies to a progressive political agenda is acknowledged. However, the argument simultaneously recognises the cooption of numerical data as a form of control in the contemporary global context of deep ontological insecurity, lack of an horizon of expectations, related incremental managerialism and ongoing hegemony of neoliberalism, despite the global financial crisis.

Keynote Address

Professor Roger Slee

Institute of Education, London

Roger is the Chair of Inclusive Education at the Institute of Education, London. He is also the Founding editor of the *International Journal of Inclusive Education* and Editor of the *London Review of Education*. He has also been the Editor of the *Australian Disability Review* for the Disability Advisory Council of Australia. Roger was formerly Deputy Director General of Education Queensland and has been a Dean at universities in England, Australia and Canada. His current research involves disability, early childhood development and curriculum development in Iraq.

Exclusion and the making of difference

In this keynote address I intend to critically reconsider the field of inclusive education. Notwithstanding the rise of inclusive education as a field for educational research and its adoption as a policy motif, I will suggest caution is required as we consider that which is presented as a move towards greater inclusion. I intend to work from a large canvas to explore the nature and complexity of exclusion as an inevitable consequence of the neo-liberal imagination which lies at the heart of international education policy-making. Add to this the bio-politics embodied in the preoccupation with calibrating and categorising the student population (the making of difference), and the rise of collective indifference in schools denies for creative thinking about inclusion.

Policy and practice

The processes and location of education policy are expanding. Policy is located with multiple agencies at regional, state, national levels. Some of these agencies are relatively new policy actors and have little or no responsibility for delivering education. The consequential lack of coupling between practice and policy accounts for the acceleration of the production of policy, apparent contradictions in policy, and an apparent hostility of much of the policy rhetoric towards the practice of teaching.

One significant manifestation of these processes and outcomes is the increased accountability of teachers for patterns of educational outcome. There also are consequences for the broader idea of an educated person, and the quality and equity of education in Australia. A significant challenge for the profession, and the policy researcher, is how to reengage practice with policy in Australian school education.
